FAST FERRIES SET TO MAKE DEBUT JAN 1

Give us a chance to prove new service will be better than existing one, says PPC chairman

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T'S all systems go for Penang Port Sdn Bhd (PPSB) to take over the more-than-a-century-old Penang ferry service come Jan 1.

All arrangements are in place,

and PPSB will use three fast ferries, which have been certified safe by the Marine Department, to carry foot passengers. Meanwhile the existing Pulau Angsa ferry will transport twowheelers (motorcycles and bicycles).

and the Pangkalan Raja Tun Uda ferry terminal here is ongoing for the new ferry service.

Penang Port Commission (PPC)

vowed to provide the best ferry service to the public amid-criticisms from various quarters, particularly former Penang chief minister and finance minister Lim Guan Eng, who had called for the iconic car-carrying ferries to continue serving.

"We (PPC and PPSB) understand that there are differing views from various quarters following the announcement to phase out the car-carrying ferries by the end of this month. We respect their viewpoints.

"But our priority is to provide the best ferry service to the people of Penang.

"As such, I hope that everyone will give us a chance to prove that this new ferry service will be bet-

ter than the existing one," he said after accompanying pressmen on a ferry ride to experience the new ferry service yester-

A fast ferry can carry up to 200 people and transport them in 10 minutes between the island and mainland during peak hours and 15 minutes during non-peak hours.

It will run 40 trips a day, at a cruising speed of between 12 knots and 15 knots from 6.30am to 11.30pm.
